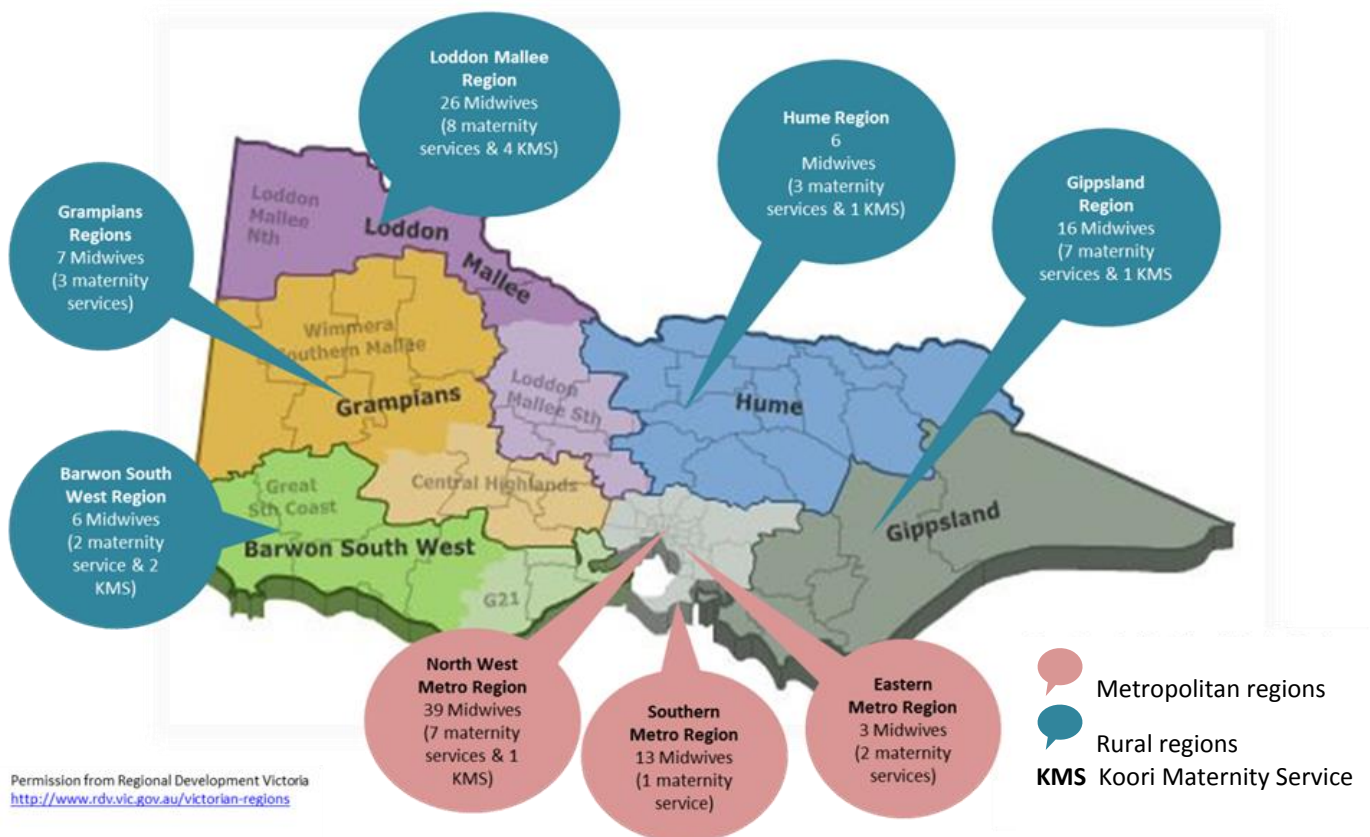
Advancing oral health in midwifery practice

April 2016

Healthy Families, Healthy Smiles has been working with Victorian midwives over the last 3 years to include oral health as part of routine care. This newsletter provides you with an update on how this work is progressing.

Growth in the number of oral health trained midwives since 2013

The first Victorian midwives completed the pilot of the University of Western Sydney's Midwifery Initiated Oral Health (MIOH) Education Program in March 2013. Their evaluation of the program was very positive in terms of appropriateness of the program to their role as midwives and increase in knowledge gained and confidence to include oral health in their practice. Since the pilot, 116 midwives from maternity services across the state have completed the MIOH program including many midwives working in Koori Maternity Services. A fourth round of MIOH started late January 2016 with 38 midwives enrolled.

MIOH training places continues to be funded by DHSV, contact us to put your name on the waiting list for the next round. We also encourage managers of maternity services to get in touch to discuss a service level approach to offering this training.

Victorian midwives' perspectives of the Midwifery Initiated Oral Health Education Program makes it to an international peer reviewed journal.

The experience of 33 Victorian midwives who were the first to pilot the Midwifery Initiated Oral Health Education Program is now documented and published in the international Biomed Central Pregnancy and Childbirth online journal. Midwives taking the oral health initiative

Since the introduction of Midwifery Initiated Oral Health Education Program many midwives have become champions of oral health.

One example has been two midwives (at the same service) who gathered information from their local private dental services on costs of a general check-up for a pregnant woman. They found quite a variation in price. They share this information with women who are not eligible to use the local public dental service.

Peninsula Health Women's Services midwives take on a partnership to increase pregnant women's access to dental services

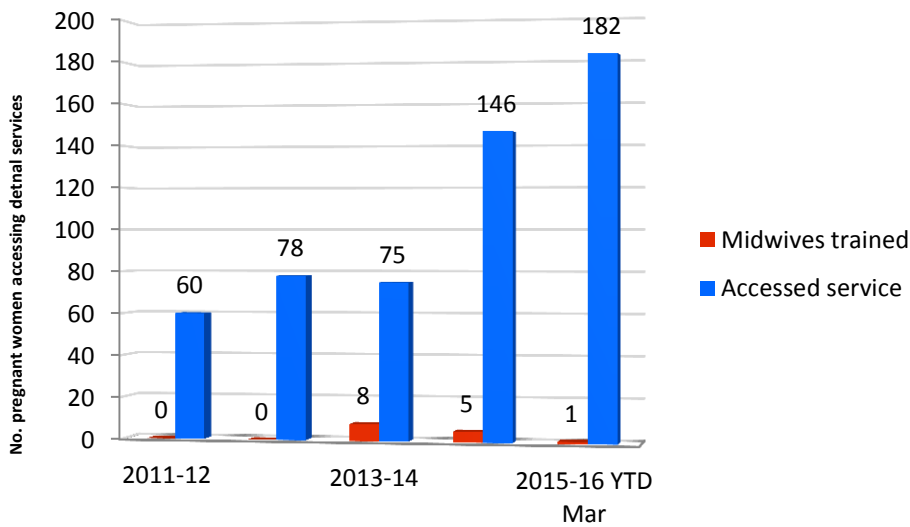
Having completed the MIOH education program the Women's Services manager at Frankston Hospital encourage the team of midwives involved in the ANC booking visit to do the MIOH program, this resulted in 13 midwives completing the training to date.

The next step was looking at how the new learnings could be put into practice. Recognising the importance of having an easy pathway for the midwives to refer clients to the local public dental service, a partnership was developed with the Health Promotion and Dental Services teams at Peninsula Health. The partnership has resulted in a simple electronic referral direct to the dental services intake desk. The referral was available on the midwives desktop in August 2014.

The strategies of management support, policy, oral health training and a clear referral process resulted in a 94.7% increase in the number of pregnant women attending the public dental service in 2014-2015.

The Peninsula Health Promotion team conducted a focus group discussion with the midwives to evaluate the impact of the E-referral, here are some of their comments

“Before oral health training and support, oral health was not a large component of our work with clients.”

“A big difference! Oral health conversations happen with clients every day.”

“If a client raised oral health concerns we passed on contact details of local dentists but the onus was on the client to follow up”

“We have the ability to refer clients directly to community dental services within our appointment times.”

Training, management policy support and a strong referral system does make a difference to pregnant women accessing dental services.

Oral Health enters the BOS reporting system

Oral health questions have now been inserted into the latest version of the Birthing Outcomes System (BOS) version 6.3.0, released in July 2015. It appears on the Physical Screen Check and Maternal Details 2 Screen. The BOS is used in 75% of Victorian maternity services. If your service is using BOS data on oral health assessments and dental referral, you can analyse your data, for example number of referrals and numbers of oral health assessments completed.

The next focus is to advocate to Department of Health and Human Services for the inclusion of oral health into the Victorian Maternity Record.

Training future workforces

To sustain oral health within midwifery practice, oral health needs to be incorporated into the professional education program for midwives at undergraduate and post graduate level.

Healthy Families, Healthy Smiles has begun partnering with local universities. In 2014 La Trobe University's School of Nursing and Midwifery expressed an interest to work with DHSV to develop oral health content resources for the students. Dr Michelle Newton (Lecturer & Course Coordinator of the Bachelor of Nursing/Bachelor of Midwifery) arranged for La Trobe's media team to video a moderated conversation between two senior midwives and an oral health expert. The midwives Deborah Pidd (Mercy Hospital for Women) and Tracey Gilbert (The Royal Women's Hospital) provide their wisdom and practice as midwives in relation to oral health and Dr Hanny Calache (Associate Professor) provides the technical side of why oral health is important in pregnancy.



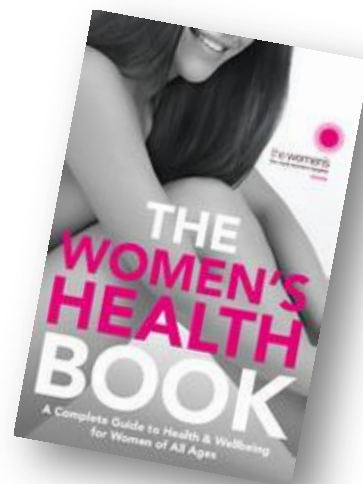

The latest [Australia's mothers and babies 2013: in brief](#) was released in 2015.

This publication presents an overview of some of the key statistics and concepts from the National perinatal data collection. Detailed information on mothers and babies include:

- demographic information
- maternal characteristics
- antenatal period
- labour and birth
- birth outcomes
- perinatal deaths.

The report also provides Indigenous-specific information for mothers; reporting on antenatal care, smoking during pregnancy, pre-existing health conditions and labour. For Indigenous babies, information included in the report focuses on gestation age, birth weight, level of care after birth and perinatal deaths.
